




Figure 3. DC Current Gain,  $V_{CE} = 20$  V




Figure 4. DC Current Gain,  $V_{CE} = 20$  V




Figure 5. DC Current Gain,  $V_{CE} = 5$  V




Figure 6. DC Current Gain,  $V_{CE} = 5$  V




Figure 7. Typical Output Characteristics




Figure 8. Typical Output Characteristics




Figure 9. Typical Saturation Voltages




Figure 10. Typical Saturation Voltages




Figure 11. Typical Base–Emitter Voltage




Figure 12. Typical Base–Emitter Voltage




Figure 13. Active Region Safe Operating Area

There are two limitations on the power handling ability of a transistor; average junction temperature and secondary breakdown. Safe operating area curves indicate  $I_C - V_{CE}$  limits of the transistor that must be observed for reliable operation; i.e., the transistor must not be subjected to greater dissipation than the curves indicate.

The data of Figure 13 is based on  $T_{J(\text{pk})} = 200^\circ\text{C}$ ;  $T_C$  is variable depending on conditions. At high case temperatures, thermal limitations will reduce the power than can be handled to values less than the limitations imposed by second breakdown.

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


Figure 14. MJ21195 Typical Capacitance




Figure 15. MJ21196 Typical Capacitance




Figure 16. Typical Total Harmonic Distortion





Figure 17. Total Harmonic Distortion Test Circuit
